Staying safe online: House Party



What is it?

Commonsense media recommends this app for children who are 16+. There have been recent concerns about a data breach involving houseparty. Although there is no evidence that this is true, it is sensible to be cautious when downloading any app which enables people to share live videos.

Houseparty is a video-focused social media app. Friends (and friends of friends) can communicate with each other via live video and texts. Because there's no screening and the video is live, there's always the possibility of inappropriate content for children, but that will largely depend on the friends who are communicating.

The biggest risks are communicating with people you don't know well, pictures and screenshots getting shared around, and spending lots of time in virtual hangouts. Parents should also note that users can send links to their profiles on the app via a text message to whomever they want, and it's possible to take a screenshot -- even of private groups -- and share it.

Remind your child to talk to you about the things they have seen online, and try to remain calm and reassuring - one of the main reasons children will be reluctant to report online incidents is a fear of 'getting into trouble'.

Secret: Do not share personal information about yourself on Houseparty, such as sharing your address or passwords.

Meeting: Do not arrange to meet someone from Houseparty.

Accepting: Only accept friend requests from and join Houseparty 'rooms' with people you know in real life.

Reliable: Know that not everything you see on Houseparty is trustworthy or true.

Tell: Report anything you see on Houseparty that makes you feel uncomfortable.
